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Message from the Director

Greetings from Harvard!

The Scandinavian Consortium for Organizational Research (SCANCOR) at the Weatherhead Center for International Affairs at Harvard University brings together top Scandinavian faculty for small-group intellectual engagement and scholarly exchange. United by their commitment to the tools of organizational science, SCANCOR scholars use their one- or two-semester stays at Harvard to forward research on a variety of projects, from the impacts of artificial intelligence on industry, to how green transitions shape financial markets, to how strategy drives decision making in business and politics, and more.

SCANCOR scholars participate in at least two seminars or workshops during their Harvard stay. The first is a SCANCOR-specific workshop in which visiting scholars share their in-progress work with each other and listen to the insights of invited Harvard academics. Scholars' second workshops are chosen from across Harvard's campuses to meet their individual research interests, and have included programs in economic sociology, international relations, development, public health policy, gender and politics, and more. SCANCOR scholars are also encouraged to take advantage of cutting-edge research methods training programs.

Each spring, SCANCOR at the Weatherhead Center at Harvard hosts an alumni conference. This conference provides an opportunity for our scholars to facilitate networks, test new research ideas, and grow their knowledge of the issues and research unfolding in their neighboring institutions and countries. In the spring of 2025, twenty-five past and present scholars presented their research across a two-day, in-person event, with hybrid options available for the few who were unable to travel.

As the 2024–2025 academic year comes to a close, the opportunities created by SCANCOR at the Weatherhead Center have only become more urgent within the world's changing organizational landscape. The rise of new political regimes in the US and Europe has resulted in government deregulation and downsizing. New immigration and refugee restrictions are changing the nature of work, while military conflicts and trade wars are restructuring old political alliances. Meanwhile, multinational corporations, transnational corporate networks, and nonstate organizations have increasingly taken on the task of defining and defending civil rights, environmental norms, and labor practices, blurring the boundaries between nonstate actors, governments, and intergovernmental relationships. These complicated and often contradictory transformations, when situated in a context of environmental degradation, rapid technological innovation, geopolitical conflicts, and an increasingly diverse and transnational workforce, call for a new generation of organizational scholars. SCANCOR at the Weatherhead Center is committed to meeting these challenges by facilitating the transnational scholarly connections required to preserve and protect data and science across national-level upheavals, and by providing top Scandinavian scholars with the time, tools, and connections required to engage these global transformations through cutting-edge scientific research.

We look forward to meeting these challenges together in the year ahead.

Research Goals

My hope was to have engagement with scholars and experts in the Harvard community to have critical feedback, not only from SCANCOR participants but with faculty.

Impact on Scholarly Work

It gave me time to work on important research and have discussions within the US where human rights are often not implemented and promoted as in much of the world. This created a space for me to have discussions with members of society to address other pathways of thinking about how to solve problems for LGBTIQ+ individuals. I am planning a proposal for a civil society and human rights project based on my SCANCOR project.

Research Goals

To find out more about the current research on my research agenda and in particular American foreign policy.

Impact on Scholarly Work

My career personally has been at a transformative moment. Because of the change in the world order which I have been studying emerged as a geopolitical question, I have been in more than high demand since I was at Harvard and afterwards. This is perhaps not a consequence of my visit but coincided with it.

At Harvard I was able to be somewhat removed from day-to-day policy work in Europe and it gave me personal time. I became happy personally and when I returned I was able to make several academic decisions and directions which required large amounts of personal courage and independence. I did those, including transferring part of my work to the leading technical university in my country and I also brought global Ukrainian studies to Finland with the first lady of Ukraine whom I met at Harvard.

Katarzyna Stoklosa

Appointment: September 10 to December 31, 2024

Research Interests: European history and political sciences; European integration; nationalism; border regions in the world; the strengthening and overcoming prejudices and stereotypes; and Ukrainian studies.

Research Goals

I have been working on my book project regarding European border regions and their inhabitants.

Impact on Scholarly Work

Thanks to the support coming from SCANCOR, I had the chance to profit from excellent libraries at Harvard. In the Widener Library, I found more sources than I had expected. At a high profit, I participated in the SCANCOR seminar in the fall of 2024, and I had the chance to discuss my outcomes and reflections with other scholars highly interested in my topic. Furthermore, I took part in the events organized by Belfer Center, Ukrainian Research Institute, and Davis Center for Russian and Eurasian Studies.

All in all, I had a highly fruitful stay at Harvard—both for my scholarly work and equally for my personal development. I profited from excellent libraries, the stimulation I got from colleagues, and the scholarly atmosphere that enabled me to concentrate and do undisturbed work on my topic.

Appointment: August 15, 2024 to June 30, 2025

Research Interests: Economic aid from non-EU developed countries to a country at war; human-made disasters and the role of charities; performance management and social impact measurement; Norway and Ukraine.

Research Goals

Primarily, I worked on the ARIES project during my research stay at SCANCOR. This research examined the complexities of peacebuilding processes and the role of development aid in supporting and reconstructing war-torn economies.

Ragnhild Kvålshaugen



Professor, Strategic Management and Professor Chair Effective and Efficient Building Processes, BI Norwegian Business School

Appointment: January 27 to May 30, 2025

Research Interests: Strategic change; strategic leadership, organizational and process innovation; digital transformation; circular economy; and interorganizational collaboration.

Research Goals

My research focuses on interorganizational collaborative strategies (IOS) for enhancing project performance and innovation/change, with particular focus on transitions to a more circular economy. My empirical context is the construction industry. The reason I wanted to visit Harvard and the SCANCOR Weatherhead Center was that they have research communities that are leading in my fields of research—interorganizational collaboration and sustainable development.

Yumi Park



Assistant Professor, Department of International Economics, Government and Business, Copenhagen Business School

Appointment: August 28, 2024 to May 30, 2025

Research Interests: International political economy, finance, and trade; financial markets; bank lobbying; and network analysis.

Research Goals

I focused on my primary area of research: the politics of international capital and finance. In particular, my main project examined how the politics of trade and finance intersect and interact to shape global patterns of economic development.

I also worked on related projects exploring how international economic cooperation and domestic politics influence and constrain one another. I chose to concentrate on these topics because they form the foundation of the book I am currently writing—the central goal of my stay.

My time at SCANCOR provided the space and support needed to focus on my research, resulting in significant progress on both the book and a related publication.

Hanna Silvola

Appointment: June 16 to May 9, 2025

Research Interests: Sustainable investing and measuring;
reporting and assuring corporate sustainability
information for strategic decision-making.

Research Goals

My research interests are in sustainable investing and in measuring, reporting and assuring corporate sustainability information for strategic decision making. During my time at SCANCOR, I had time to focus on revising my existing papers in the process but also developing new research ideas. Being a sustainability/ESG focused researcher, the impact of the political changes on stock markets and investor behavior were interesting to follow. I think I was privileged to be able to follow up the debate here in the US and develop new research projects based on the empirical changes I observed in the daily life of US consumers and investors.

Impact on Scholarly Work

I could never imagine how exceptional time I would spend at Harvard. We had a very intensive group of visiting scholars, and we built strong connections for the future too, including joining PhD courses and some ideas for the future projects.

My time at SCANCOR Weatherhead happened where Harvard was in the middle of political turbulence. Compared to my earlier visit in the US (Stanford University in 2014), the political debate was much more intensive this time—not only in the academic community but in society more generally. This made me realize the value of academic freedom and a real need for objective scientific evidence—all this I have taken for granted in the past.

Frauke Urban



Professor and Docent, Management of Sustainable Energy Systems, Department of Industrial Economics and Management (INDEK) at KTH Royal Institute of Technology

Appointment: January 26 to June 30, 2025

Research Interests: Energy policy; climate policy; decarbonization of energy systems, transport and industries; innovation in renewable energy; and organizational change for green transformations.

Research Goals

My mission was to be able to focus on research in the field of organizational change. Analyzing strategies for reducing the climate impact of energy, transport and industries, including from a comparative perspective between the Nordics and the US. The stay at SCANCOR gave me the possibility to focus on my research, conduct data collection, data analysis and write papers. It also enabled me to make new connections, expand my network, gain new knowledge and get inspiration for new research ideas.

Impact on Scholarly Work

Global climate change is one of the biggest challenges of our times. This research contributes to an improved understanding of how to achieve organizational change for sustainable energy transitions and climate change mitigation. The outcomes can be useful for policy and practice regarding options to reduce emissions and decarbonize economies and industries, which is relevant for the US, the Nordics and wider Europe. As a scholar I have had the time to focus more on research, and less on teaching and management.

The research environment at Harvard and in the Boston area is world class, and I have enjoyed learning about excellent, cutting-edge research, meeting leading scholars in my field and getting new perspectives and ideas that I will take home to my work in Sweden.

Suen Wang



Assistant Professor, Department of Politics and Society, Aalborg University

Appointment: January 15 to June 30, 2025

Research Interests: Gender, democracy, social justice, and education; relationships between gender equality and social policies across advanced democracies; new democracies, and autocracies; and comparative political economy.

Research Goals

My primary goal for visiting SCANCOR at Weatherhead was to experience firsthand the research environment and intellectual climate of a top academic institution like Harvard.

Beyond advancing the project on gender representation in political science, my time here was highly productive across several research endeavors. This included finalizing work on a project examining gender quotas and equitable access to public sector jobs, which was recently published in *Democratization*; completing major revisions for a study concerning natural disasters, democracy, and government spending; and advancing an analysis of gender quotas and representation within the European Parliament.

Impact on Scholarly Work

My fellowship at SCANCOR at Weatherhead profoundly impacted my research trajectory and scholarly development. The unique environment enabled crucial progress on my work, most notably facilitating essential qualitative data collection for my gender representation project through direct access to leading Harvard scholars—an opportunity unavailable at my home institution. Professionally, the dense concentration of seminars across various fields and enriching interactions within the diverse SCANCOR cohort and wider Harvard community offered unparalleled opportunities for growth, broadening my intellectual perspectives and methodological toolkit. While the stay primarily accelerated and deepened existing research streams, the stimulating environment has certainly planted seeds for future projects and collaborations. The overall experience has been invaluable in shaping my ongoing scholarly work and future research directions.
